COURSE DESCRIPTION:

A studio experience that gives the advanced student an opportunity to work on period characterization and production styles. 4 credits.

STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Students will:

- Learn to analyze and critically evaluate characters and elements of a play script.
- Gain a broader understanding and appreciation of various theatrical genres and historical periods.
- Develop creative capacities that reflects the themes and moods of a theatrical work.
- To acquire skills in working with others as a member of a acting ensemble.

ATTENDANCE & TARDINESS:

According to Theatre Departmental Policy, your grade will drop by 50 points for each unexcused absence after the first 3. Excused absences include participation in a college sanctioned event. Any other absence from class is considered unexcused. If you are sick or know you are going to be gone from class, please email me and let me know.

NO ABSENCE, whatever the reason, relieves the student of responsibility for completing all work assigned. IT IS UP TO THE STUDENT TO FIND OUT WHAT WORK AND ASSIGNMENTS THEY MISSED.

<u>Lateness is disruptive and disrespectful to your fellow classmates, and will lower your grade as follows: 2 tardies = 1 absence.</u> If you enter the classroom more than 10 minutes after the official start of class, you will be marked absent for that day.

If your coach/faculty does not send an email with a list of participants, the date of the event, and the time of the event, you will be counted absent. Please remind your coach/faculty to send an appropriate reminder that you are attending a school sanctioned event in order to be in compliance. All work must be finished by the next class period upon your return from the event.

CELLPHONES/COMPUTERS & TABLETS:

Please turn off all cell phones before coming into class. Students are not allowed to use their cell phones during class. If a student is caught using their cell phone during class they will be asked to leave class, and they will be counted absent for the day.

Students will not be allowed to take notes on a computer or tablet. There may be days that you will need your computer for a class activity; in such cases, students will be notified in advance when they need to bring computers to class.

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY POLICY:

Your work should be your own. Professionalism is expected from you. Should another person attempt to "borrow" your work – whether on tests or assignments, please let me know. The college does have a procedure for academic misconduct. The protection of academic integrity requires clear and consistent standards and definitions, as well as confrontation and sanctions when individuals intentionally violate those standards. The most important of the definitions is that of academic dishonesty. Academic dishonesty undermines the educational experience, lowers morale by engendering a skeptical attitude about the quality of education, and negatively affects the relationship between students and faculty.

Academic dishonesty is the intentional act of fraud, in which an individual seeks to claim credit for the work and efforts of another, or uses unauthorized material or fabricated information in any academic exercise. Academic dishonesty also includes, but is not limited to:

This class will require students to meet for scene rehearsals outside of class time. You may check out rehearsal time in Klinger-Neal theatre by signing up on the calendar located in the hallway by the callboard. Please note that the Director/Stage Manager of any main stage production may bump you from the space for reasons related to the main stage show. Students in this class will be able to access Klinger-Neal theatre after hours by contacting Campus Security (712-274-5234). Student that access Klinger for rehearsals are responsible for any missing equipment or damage caused by themselves or others students they allow in the building. Also note that Klinger-Neal is monitored 24/7 by security cameras and security alarms in specific areas of the building.

*Weekly Play Response (WPR):

Every week students in this class will be required to read a play and write a 2 to 3 page analysis/reflection over it (MLA, Double Spaced, etc.). For each play Prof. Clemens will assign a specific focus for the paper. Focuses for the paper maybe things like: given circumstances, character analysis, actions & tactics, social & political implications, economic implications, language analysis, etc. THESE PAPERS SHOULD NOT BE A PLOT SUMMURY OF THE PLAY. If time permits, we will have a brief in-class discussion over they play each week. Please note that the final exam will be made up of multiple choice and essay questions over some of the plays. The weekly play responses make up 130pts or 18% of your final grade so make sure you put effort into them. Some of the plays will be from the required textbooks and others will be supplied as PDF on Moodle.

**Class Participation:

Since this class has a heavily performance and partner based projects it is very important that you miss as little class as possible. Many classes will be spent working on your own scenes or watching and analyzing your classmate's scenes. If you miss a class, this directly effects the education of your scene partner and your classmates as well as has a negative impact on your final grade.

***PLAY ATTENDANCE & REVIEW:

You are required to attend Morningside's two fall main stage productions and prepare a critique. Show 1: *Love*, *Sex*, *and The IRS* performs October 12th – 14th @ 7:00pm & Oct. 15th @ 2:00pm. Show 2: *Princess and the Pea* performs November 10th – 11th @ 7:00pm & Nov. 12th @ 2:00pm. This review should be between 3 and 4 pages, in MLA format (Times new roman, 11pt, double-spaced, etc) and should focus on all the components of theatre as viewed during the production you attend. You should discuss acting styles, directing, text (the written play itself), scenic design, costume design, music, lighting, and sound, among others. This is due no later than 1 week after the production closes. Students must also include a ticket stub and program.

TURNING IN WORK:

In the event of a class absence your assignment can be turned in to me in my office (or put in the file holder on my office door) by 5pm that day. I DO NOT ACCEPT EMAILED WORK. All late work will lose 10 points for each day it is late. This includes non-class days and weekends. Students will have 1 class period to make up any missed performances or in class rehearsal. After 1 class period, the student will receive an automatic 50% reduction on the final assignment grade.

EXTRA CREDIT:

There are two ways to obtain extra credit:

- 1. Attend a theatrical event outside of the Morningside community and write a 3-4 page reflection paper on it. Reflections must be turn in within 1 week of the event and students must also turn in a program and the ticket stub from the event. Must be MLA format (11pt, Times New Roman, Double Spaced). Worth 10 points. (Maximum of 3 events or 30 points)
- 2. Prepare a full script analysis of one of the weekly plays. You must completely fill out and answer all questions found on the script analysis form on Moodle. See Prof. Clemens for more details. Worth 50pts.

Students are limited to a maximum of 50 extra credit points. Also, if a Student has more than 3 unexcused absences they may not take advantage of the extra credit opportunities and any extra

credit already completed will no longer be valid.
